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# OPPOSING THE POTENTIAL BAN ON WOOD BURNING IN NEW YORK AS PROPOSED BY THE CLIMATE ACTION COUNCIL

By Mr. Lightfoot, Chair, Services Committee Co-Sponsored Mr. Forsythe, District 2; Mr. Reagen, District 1; and Ms. Curran, District 15

WHEREAS, on July 18, 2019, the Climate Leadership and Community Protection Act (Climate Act) was signed into law in New York State, and is considered among the most ambitious climate laws in the world and requires New York to reduce economy-wide greenhouse gas emissions 40% by 2030, and no less than 85% by 2050 from 1990 levels, and

WHEREAS, Senate Bill S6599 and Assembly Bill A8429, "An act to amend the environmental conservation law, the public service law, the public authorities law, the labor law and the community risk and resilience act, in relation to establishing the New York State climate leadership and community protection act" was passed by the Senate and Assembly and signed by the Governor, and

WHEREAS, the Climate Action Council is researching ways to limit greenhouse gas emissions and achieve the goals of The Climate Act, and in a draft plan members of the advisory panel to the Climate Action Council describe scenarios where wood consumption decreases within that time frame, and this could mean a potential future ban on wood-burning stoves, and in an additional reduction effort, the possible elimination of natural gas hookups, and

WHEREAS, winters in Upstate New York are long and cold, and many people in St. Lawrence County and other rural communities rely on wood-burning stoves for heat, and taking away an affordable heating source could be detrimental to many families who depend on on burning wood as the sole source of heat in their homes, and

**WHEREAS**, a ban on wood burning would have a major impact on many St. Lawrence County households, including the Amish population who rely on wood burning stoves for cooking and cost-effective energy,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED the Board of Legislators opposes the potential ban on wood burning in New York as proposed by the Climate Action Council, and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** the Climate Actions Council will hold a 120 day public comment period, beginning January 1<sup>st</sup>, and will hold at least six public hearings across the State, both in-person and virtual, and the Board of Legislators encourages St. Lawrence County citizens to voice their concerns at <a href="www.nyserda.seamlessdocs.com/f/DraftScopingComments">www.nyserda.seamlessdocs.com/f/DraftScopingComments</a> or email <a href="scopingplan@nyserda.ny.gov">scopingplan@nyserda.ny.gov</a> or by mail to: Draft Scoping Plan Comments, NYSERDA, 17 Columbia Circle, Albany, New York 12203-6399, and

The Clinic Manager will supervise the medication dispensing within the Opioid Treatment Program, including daily in-clinic dosing and take-home dosing. The Clinic Manager will be the primary person providing medication dispensing from 7am-12pm daily. The anticipated clinic revenue for this position is \$54,394.

This position is vital for the successful operation of the Opioid Treatment Program. If this position is not filled it may interfere with our ability to receive final approval from the state and federal oversight agencies which are needed to open the OTP.

This position will oversee medication ordering, inventory, delivery schedules, and insure that proper wasting procedures are followed and documented per DEA guidelines. The Clinic Manager will coordinate take-home dosing schedules for clinic clients and the distribution of the medication provided for the correctional facility inmates. The Clinic Manager will be responsible for ensuring dispensing equipment is properly cleaned and calibrated on a regular basis. This person will maintain an accurate and up-to-date client profiles on the New York State DOH Central Registry to ensure clients are not active in another OTP program. They will be responsible for maintaining documentation of medication dispensing and caseload information for the US Drug Enforcement Agency reviews, provide assessment and reassessment of clients to determine appropriate level of care, and coordinate care with prescribers and an interdisciplinary treatment team.

On October 7th, 2021 Governor Kathy Hochul signed into law Legislation S.1795/A.868 aimed toward reducing drug-related overdose deaths across New York State and encouraging those suffering from addiction to seek help in their recovery. Expanding medication assisted treatment, MAT, across state and local facilities will allow incarcerated individuals access to medications and therapies to provide them the opportunity to overcome substance use and lessen the likelihood that they may suffer drug-related overdoses upon their reentry into society. This mandate requires that all inmates are assessed, diagnosed, provided individual counseling, group counseling, peer services, and transition services (discharge planning). It is estimated that between 50-70% of our inmate population will participate in the expanded SUD treatment within our correctional facililty.

If the position is not filled we would not be in compliance with the NYS State mandate as we would be unable to meet the demand of the current jail census with existing staff. Access to care is paramount given the current Opioid crisis. This position is 100% funded through an increase in Jail based state aide for SUD treatment services. This position will assess, diagnose, and provide individual and group counseling to the inmates receiving MAT services, allowing us to meet our requirement to the above mandate.

This position is responsible for the oversight and supervision of the Employment Unit of the Department of Social Services which engages applicants and recipients of Temporary Assistance and other benefits in employment activities that assist in becoming self-sufficient. This is accomplished by providing opportunities for paid employment, work experience, community service, educational and vocational training, job readiness training, and organized job search. The Employment Unit staff members also make referrals and monitor participation in treatment plans for chemical dependency and substance abuse as well as mental health services. Employment Unit workers are responsible for providing supportive services that are deemed necessary for individuals to participate in orientation, assessment, employment planning, work activities, and activities to help lead to financial self-sufficiency. Supportive services may include transportation assistance; child care assistance; car repair; clothing and/or tools; professional licensing fees; and driver permit/licensing fees. The Coordinator oversees the Unit's counselors and support staff (8.91 other Full Time Equivalents) who attempt to serve approximately 900 County residents. If this position is not filled, the Department will lack the ability to adequately coordinate mandated requirements to engage residents in work activities and monitor those activities.
