





Average CPS Caseload












Supplemental Nutrional Assistance Program (SNAP) by Zipcode October 2022



WHEREAS, the New York State Office for the Aging requires each Office for the Aging to submit an Annual Update Plan (AU) for funding, and

WHEREAS, these funds enable the Office for the Aging to provide a variety of programs and services to county residents age 60 and older to help them age in place, and

WHEREAS, the completed Annual Update Plan for funding package must be signed by the Chief Executive Officer of St. Lawrence County,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Legislators authorizes the Chair to sign the 2023 Annual Update Plan (AU) for Funding with the New York State Office for the Aging, upon approval of the County Attorney.

EXECUTIVE ORDER

Establishing the New York State Master Plan for Aging

WHEREAS, New York has demonstrated its commitment to an age-friendly environment to ensure that all New Yorkers can age with dignity and independence through policies that promote the value of healthy, meaningful aging; these policies include the New York State Prevention Agenda, Health Across All Policies, Age-Friendly New York, the Age-Friendly Health System Initiative, and the New York State Plan on Aging;

WHEREAS, New York has the fourth-largest population of older adults in the U.S., with 3.2 million New Yorkers (16 percent of the population) over 65. New York's population of those over the age of 60 is projected to grow to 5.3 million by 2030 with those over eighty years of age exceeding 1.2 million; By 2030, it is projected that 25 percent of the population in more than 51 counties will be 60 and older with at least 30 percent of the population in 18 counties 60 or older. The older adult population is growing faster than any other age group in the state;

WHEREAS, New York takes great pride in being named the first Age-Friendly State in the nation by the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP), a status based on the World Health Organization's eight domains of livability: outdoor spaces and buildings, transportation, housing, social participation, respect and social inclusion, work and civic engagement, communication and information, community and health services;

WHEREAS, New York has been a leader in advancing policies that address social determinants of health, including the conditions in which people are born, grow, work, live, play, and age, as well as the wider set of forces and systems shaping the conditions of daily life, which have a tremendous impact on the health and well-being of all people;

WHEREAS, the majority of New Yorkers want to remain in the State during their retirement years. Older adults and baby boomers generate sixty-three percent of the household income in the State, supporting the economy and the tax base:

WHEREAS, with aging there is an increase in health care utilization and health-related conditions, including chronic diseases. New York needs to assure that our health care system is prepared to handle the coming demands and preferences for care, especially long term care;

WHEREAS, the public funding of long-term care through Medicaid and Medicare is substantial, and should support the broad goals of healthy aging;

WHEREAS, health care workforce issues must be addressed, along with ways to better support informal and family caregivers;

WHEREAS, older adults, and those with disabilities, should be able to choose to remain in their communities and whereas meaningful choice requires access to a broad range of public and private programs, resources, and supports, including health care, home care, food and nutrition, human services, housing and transportation;

WHEREAS, family caregivers struggle to balance work and caregiving, provide essential care for older adults and those with disabilities, and demand for this family care is growing.

WHEREAS, issues regarding access to affordable, suitable housing, transportation, the ability to age in place, mental health, isolation, ageism, opportunities for civic engagement and the prevention of elder abuse must be addressed in a comprehensive manner;

WHEREAS, it is important for the State to prioritize the needs of our aging population with a positive focus and to engage the public and those who serve older citizens in a meaningful planning process;

WHEREAS, planning for the opportunities and challenges that will result from change in the State's aging population, so New Yorkers of all ages can continue to live fulfilling lives, as independently as possible, in good health, and with the freedom to choose to age in place, requires a new level of strategic planning;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Kathy Hochul, Governor of the State of New York, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and Laws of the State of New York, and more specifically, Article IV, Section 1 of the New York State Constitution do hereby order and direct as follows:

- That a New York State Master Plan for Aging shall coordinate existing and new state policy and programs
 creating a blueprint of strategies to be implemented to ensure older New Yorkers can live fulfilling lives, in
 good health, with freedom, dignity and independence to age in place for as long as possible.
- 2. The New York State Department of Health, in coordination with the State Office for the Aging, shall convene a Master Plan for Aging Council to advise the Governor in developing the New York State Master Plan for Aging. The Commissioner of Health, or their designee, shall serve as the Chair of the Council, and the Acting Director, or their designee, of the State Office for the Aging, shall serve as the Vice Chair of the Council. Members of the Council shall include the Commissioners and Directors of relevant Executive agencies and offices, as determined by the Governor, or their designees.
- Executive branch agencies are directed to participate on and assist with the work of the Master Plan for Aging Council.
- 4. The Master Plan for Aging Council shall be convened within sixty days of the enactment of this order and present the recommended Master Plan for Aging to the Governor for issuance no later than twenty-four months following the first meeting of the Stakeholder Advisory Committee.
- 5. The New York State Department of Health, in coordination the State Office for the Aging and Master Plan for Aging Council, shall convene a Stakeholder Advisory Committee to advise the Governor and the Master Plan for Aging Council in the development of the Master Plan. The Chair and Vice Chair of the Council shall serve as the Chair and Vice Chair of the Stakeholder Advisory Committee.
 - a. The Stakeholder Advisory Committee shall include representation from a broad array of those committed to the planning necessary to keep and improve New York's standing as one of the most age-friendly states. The Advisory Committee members shall be recommended by the Chair and Vice Chair, and may include, but not be limited to, health care and support service providers, consumers, informal caregivers, older adults particularly those in communities experiencing disparities, health plans, labor organizations, community-based organizations, employers, experts on aging, academic researchers, foundations, local governments, and tribal communities.
 - b. The Stakeholder Advisory Committee shall prepare a preliminary report within six-months of the first meeting of the Stakeholder Advisory Committee that details the intended activities of the Committee and shall include target measures that will be tracked over time. Reports detailing the Committee's activities and progress shall be available upon request.
 - c. The Stakeholder Advisory Committee shall prepare an advisory report to be delivered to the Master Plan for Aging Council and the Governor, no later than eighteen months following the first meeting of the Stakeholder Advisory Committee.
 - d. The Stakeholder Advisory Committee shall have subcommittees dedicated to long term care services and supports, community-based services, and caregivers. These subcommittees shall make a report directly to the Advisory Committee, the Master Plan for Aging Council and the Governor within twelve months following the first meeting of the Stakeholder Advisory Committee.
 - e. The Stakeholder Advisory Committee may form additional subcommittees.
- 6. The Master Plan for Aging plan development process shall include ongoing opportunities for engagement with the public, which may include public comment periods during Advisory Committee meetings, town hall or similar forums for input, or any other means of public engagement deemed appropriate by the Chair.

7. The Master Plan for Aging Council and the Master Plan for Aging Advisory Committee shall have the authority to convene meetings, form subcommittees, workgroups and focus groups to work on specific issues, and create a website for the purpose of posting notices, meeting materials and other information necessary to carry out the development of the Master Plan for Aging.

WHEREAS, a gubernatorial statewide task force on reforming preschool special education determined that counties should be removed completely from financing the preschool special education program of the State, and

WHEREAS, New York State enacted legislation to provide universal prekindergarten for all age eligible children to be financed one-hundred percent (100%) with State resources, and

WHEREAS, the State also requires counties to support ten percent (10%) of summer school special education 4408 program costs for all children, and

WHEREAS, NYSAC estimates the financial cost borne by counties for this rate increase is approximately \$50 million annually, and

WHEREAS, when the definition of Elevated Blood Lead Level (EBLL) was lowered from 10 to 5 ug/dL or greater, the State only allocated an additional \$9.7 million for Article Six State aid, and

WHEREAS, this investment falls short of the \$40 million needed to implement this work and protect children, thereby placing the majority of the cost burden (\$30.3 million) on the local tax levy, and

WHEREAS, this estimated need is based on an average cost per case of nurse case management of \$713 and an average cost of \$2,123 per case for environmental management activities, and

WHEREAS, at the January 29, 2020, Lead Poisoning Prevention Advisory Council meeting, the New York State Department of Health (NYSDOH) presented data on the first quarter of implementation that showed an additional 1,725 children between the ranges of 5-9 μ g/dL required interventions, and

WHEREAS, while this highlights the importance of lowering the EBLL, it also represents the equivalent to 2.5 years of work occurring in a single quarter when compared to prior years, and

WHEREAS, counties recognize the extraordinary impact the COVID-19 pandemic has had on children and families at risk for lead exposure due to stay-at-home orders, remote learning, and barriers to attending pediatric appointments and access testing for lead screening, and

WHEREAS, in 2021, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) further lowered the recommendation to 3.5 μ g/dL which, if adopted by New York State, would cost an additional \$30 million to implement locally, and

WHEREAS, new and expanded duties placed on local health departments, as well as existing duties that are underfunded, may result in increased civil liability for our county governments, and

WHEREAS, county governments will allocate existing and new investments to support the lower EBLL through this program to secure and maintain the necessary staffing and other resources required to accomplish the goals set forth by the state mandate, while also ensuring that New York State keeps its promise to property taxpayers through its enactment of a permanent property tax cap,

WHEREAS, local departments of social services work closely with OCFS and voluntary agencies to reduce the use of congregate care and to place children with relatives and foster parents, and

WHEREAS, children with complex needs rely on services offered in residential settings, and

WHEREAS, if these placements become ineligible for federal funding, some service providers will discontinue their programs, and others will exist solely on state and local funding, and

WHEREAS, under the New York State Foster Care Block Grant, the entire burden would be on counties unless the state makes a specific new fiscal commitment, and

WHEREAS, the State is currently pursuing a temporary 1115 Medicaid waiver as the solution to this problem, and

WHEREAS, the waiver the State is submitting is so restrictive many providers indicate the rules would not enable them to continue providing services, and

WHEREAS, the Local Governmental Units (LGUs)/Directors of Community Services (DCSs) have specific responsibilities and authority under the Local Services provisions of Article 41 of the NYS Mental Hygiene Law (MHL) for planning, development, implementation, and oversight of services to adults and children in their counties affected by mental illness, substance use disorder, and intellectual/developmental disabilities (I/DD), and

WHEREAS, localities continue to struggle with an overwhelmed community-based system of care that is unable to adequately support children and youth with co-occurring disorders, and

WHEREAS, the Directors of Community Services (DCSs) are seeing firsthand and have growing concerns regarding the upward trend in children and youth with complex behavioral health needs ending up in EDs due to unmet needs, and

WHEREAS, State inpatient bed closures and a lack of available crisis services have significantly impacted the ability of counties to provide this higher-level care and has resulted in various placements in last-resort settings, which are not appropriate and sometimes detrimental to the treatment goals, and

WHEREAS, some at-risk youth have been placed out of the State for residential services, reflecting the need to develop additional appropriate services within New York with a full spectrum of services available, and

WHEREAS, over the last several years, there has been a substantial rise in the numbers of children and youth languishing in EDs without the ability to be connected to appropriate care, and

WHEREAS, EDs are a suboptimal setting for children and youth, particularly if they are not at imminent risk of harm to themselves or others, and often offer overstimulating environments, exposure to other psychiatrically and medically ill individuals, and an absence of appropriate assessment and treatment, and

WHEREAS, according to a 2021 report by the Healthcare Association of NYS (HANYS), a 15-year-old youth was placed in an ED for over three months after a yearlong search for residential placement, which resulted in over \$195,000 in hospital costs and, after over 6 months in the ED, a 16-year-old patient decompensated so severely and required oversight by two public safety officers and three to five beds to minimize disruption to other patients, and

WHEREAS, a child in Franklin County with a significant trauma history and diagnosed conduct disorder was placed in a standard ED and languished for 8 weeks after being denied admission at a sister hospital within the same health system that contained a 9.39 unit, and

WHEREAS, the State must make appropriate targeted investments to include local resource streams for localities to initiate treatment models with proven success, such as expansion of intensive treatment programs and prevention and early intervention programs including mobile crisis response and family and caregiver supports, and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED the Board of Legislators requests targeted State investments in programming and policies to develop and fund core local services to decrease the use of Emergency Departments (EDs) for the treatment of children and youth with complex behavioral health needs, and

This position will also be a liaison to hospitals for communicable disease investigations.

Communicable disease investigations are on the rise, in a globally connected world, now more than ever. We are currently operating under a Statewide Disaster Emergency for both Monkeypox and Polio. The last several years have shown the importance of having a staff member dedicated to Communicable Diseases, not only for a pandemic, but outbreaks, as well as regular occurrences of diseases. Additionally, the creation of this position would allow current nursing staff to focus on work that can only be completed by those with nursing expertise and spend less time on activities that could be completed by someone with a background in public health and knowledge of infectious disease conditions. This position will be vital to moving forward and providing the level of detail needed to investigate and respond to the increasing number of reports received on a daily basis.

The impact on the Department if this position were not filled would include a reduced ability to deter fraud land recover funds. This Investigator/Examiner position is responsible for responding to complaints of fraud, State Mandated Front End Detection; PARIS (out-of-state matches); Prison, Felon, and Electronic Benefit Transfer matches; Eligibility Verification Reviews; and post and pre-inspection security agreements. Year to date 2022, 441 referrals were received by the Investigations Unit and over \$165,501 in overpayments were identified. Currently the Department has approximately 220 open referrals. The position is responsible for cost savings because clients are deterred from committing fraud, but the position also is responsible for cost avoidance because clients who are defrauding the government lose their assistance. Year to date in 2022, this Unit is responsible for cost avoidance of \$195,170. If this position is not filled, the other three investigators would not be able to adequately absorb the work load, and fraud complaints would not be as adequately investigated. Required efforts to prevent fraud by meeting with at-risk clients before they receive benefits also would not be able to be carried out in a timely manner.

Caseworkers in Child Protective Services (CPS) investigate allegations of child abuse and maltreatment in St. Lawrence County that are made to the State Central Register. If this position were not filled, the impact would compromise child safety and reduce the ability of CPS to maintain the high standards set by the Department of Social Services and the State to ensure the safety of children in St. Lawrence County. While the Office of Children and Family Services recommends 15 active investigations per CPS Caseworker per month, the average caseload size in CPS is 10 as of September 2022. Not filling this Child Protective Caseworker position further delays the existing timeline of approximately 5 months from the first day of work to the time the Caseworker can initiate reports independently, due to significant training requirements including 6 weeks when they are completely out of the office for training. Cases must be initiated within 24 hours, and virtually all new reports require face to face contact with the families within 24 hours. Without adequate staff to fulfill this requirement, staff will be required to work overtime in cases that require immediate contact due to health and safety concerns. Further, supervisors will be working as Caseworkers to fill the gap, and will be unavailable to supervise their workers. Due to the increased severity of cases (specifically cases involving caregivers who are using heroin and methamphetamines) additional face to face visits, time preparing for court, casework counseling, referrals and follow up is now required. Cases are becoming more complex and our Caseworkers are finding children in dire situations on a daily basis. This position is mandated and necessary to meet the regulatory requirements and ensure the health and safety of children/families.

The person in this position is responsible for Service Plan Review letters; court cards; reminders for all legal activity for the Unit; foster care placement documentation; movements of children in foster care: special payment for foster parents; clothing allowance payments for foster parents; caseloads and case logs; tracking case requirements; opening and closing of cases on the New York State Welfare Management System for foster care and preventive cases and the accurate recording of placement dates to ensure proper payment to providers; foster care subsidies; mailing; copying; and typing. Without this essential position, it would be impossible to comply with or successfully participate in Office of Children and Family Services audits. Further, DSS would receive sanctions for not being timely with service plan review letters to clients. Legal paperwork that is not completed and processed timely can result in children remaining in care longer than is necessary, at an increased expense to the Department. Keyboards in Child Welfare not only complete their own duties, they also ensure that all required documentation is completed by the caseworkers and communicate with the supervisor to ensure that work is being completed timely. Child Welfare Supervisors rely on the Keyboard to assist with this vital quality assurance role. This position will handle approximately 70+ foster youth with foster care placements, kinship placements as well as preventive youth placed in relative care.
