
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
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
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
Clinic Counselor Visits Average




Addiction Services Visits Per Seven Hours




Mental Health Visits Per Seven Hours




Addiction Services Weighted Face to Face




Mental Health Weighted Face to Face %



NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Legislators recognizes the month of April as National Child Abuse Prevention Month.



The Senior Employment and Training Counselor carries out internal audits and reviews Department records to ensure adherence to the Temporary Assistance and Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program Employment Plan. The role of this Counselor is important for improving participation and engagement rates, preparing quality assurance reports, and making sure that supportive services, such as transportation, are effective. The person in this position works with a representative from the Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance to match participants with various funding sources and employers to promote individual and economic growth in St. Lawrence County. If this position were not filled, the Department would not be able to serve County residents as effectively and there would be a less significant reduction in the use of Temporary Assistance and Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program benefits.

The Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP) involves the issuing of fuel and utility payments to eligible families with low incomes. Social Welfare Examiners make the financial eligibility determinations, and staff in other units could not adequately absorb the duties. Not filling this position would be extremely difficult since there is a very strong need for service once the colder weather is upon us and lack of staffing would place County residents at unnecessary risk. The 2021-2022 HEAP season started early this season, October 1, 2021, and applications for regular and emergency benefits will continue to be accepted until April 29, 2022. As of February 25, 2022 HEAP has received 4395 regular applications and 2154 emergency applications. Most seasons, households can potentially apply for up to 5 benefits with separate applications (regular, 1st emergency fuel, 1st emergency utility, 2nd emergency fuel, 2nd emergency utility). During 2021-2022 season, a Regular Arrears Supplement (RAS) benefit became available to households that incurred arrears with any active utility account. This benefit began September 22, 2021 and increased the potential applications to 7 per household. For 2021-2022, there has been 7411 regular HEAP benefits, 2181 emergency benefits, 30 repairs and replacements, as well as 1106 RAS benefits authorized as of March 1, 2022. Temporary HEAP staff costs are fully reimbursed with the HEAP administrative allocation which was set at 90% of the district's administrative ceiling for Fiscal year 2021.

This position is needed to interview clients who wish to have paternity established and/or seek a financial and medical child support order, and to assist clients with violation petitions, modification petitions, and affidavits. This position is also responsible for preparing interstate petitions and documents concerning paternity, support, enforcement and modification of child support obligations; responding to incoming mail and electronic referrals from the New York State Child Support Helpline; reviewing various reports received concerning administrative actions, such as license suspension, cost of living adjustments, property executions, and tax referrals; and interacting with co-workers, other units within the Department, Family Court, attorneys, and intrastate and interstate agencies. This program benefits approximately 5,000 families which annually receive a total exceeding \$12,000,000 of child support. If the position were not filled, the ability to serve these families and reduce the need for the County to provide other benefits to support children would be compromised and place the County at increased risk of losing State funding to support child support collection.
